# Free Slideshow Lecture October 7th: Renaming Dypsis Species and Reconstructing a Phylogenetic Tree



HIPS is proud to host a free public slideshow lecture by Dr. Wolf Eiserhardt, Associate Professor at Aarhus University, and an Honorary Research Associate at the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew (UK). Dr. Eiserhardt will introduce a new phylogenetic tree for the palm sub tribe Dypsidinae. The work by Dr. Eiserhardt and his colleagues was just published in the journal *Taxon* on August 24, 2022. While garden owners may bemoan the changes to their plant labels, the effort behind this new classification represents a crucial step in understanding the spectacular diversity of palm species in Madagascar. Out of the 178 palm species in the large sub tribe, all but four of those are found nowhere else but on the island of Madagascar. How is this even possible?

Learn what is and is not a Dypsis - aligning genetics and morphology. Along the way you will have a chance to test your retention and win some Madagascar palms to take home with you.

For extra credit, check out the original paper, <u>Phylogenomics and generic limits of Dypsidinae (Arecaceae)</u>, the <u>largest palm radiation in Madagascar.</u>

#### Where IPS is going:

Before arriving in Hilo, the International Palm Society will be starting their biennial with a small group visiting Maui for a pre tour on October 6th. They will visit The Merwin Conservancy, the wonderful garden of HIPS member Jerry Welch, and the Sewell Art Estate featuring outdoor sculptures made from discarded sheet metal tooling pieces from various defunct Maui sugar mills.

The pre tour attendees will meet the rest of the biennial folks October 9<sup>th</sup> on Oahu to kick off the Hawaii 2022 Biennial with visits to Lyon Arboretum, Foster Garden, and Ho'omaluhia Garden on the north shore. They will enjoy evening lectures from Wolf Eiserhardt (see previous article), and Mike DeMotta from NTBG talking about Hawaiian Pritchardia conservation.

On October 11<sup>th</sup> the group arrives in Hilo. Along with visiting some of Hawaii Islands most celebrated private gardens, attendees will also tour the Hawaii Tropical Bioreserve and Garden (formerly Hawaii Tropical Botanical Garden) on Onomea Bay. A special tour on their free day will take them to cross the saddle to the Kona side and visit Norm Bezona's Kona Cloud Forest Sanctuary and Dean Ouer's incredible garden where they will have lunch. There will be evening lectures on the 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup>.

HIPS members can attend the evening lectures at the Hilo Hawaiian Hotel October 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> and help the IPS further its scientific and educational purpose. All proceeds go to the International Palm Society.

**Don Hemmes**, professor emeritus UH Hilo, welcomes biennial attendees to Hawaii Island and talks about the early days of HIPS and its legacy garden at the Panaewa Zoo, and the story behind the UH Hilo Botanical Garden with its extensive cycad collection and palmy river walk.

Jason Dewees, award winning author of the book *Designing With Palms*, will illustrate how palms are used to create stunning garden landscapes. Jason gave a very popular lecture to HIPS a few years back on this subject and it is sure to spark ideas for your own garden.

**Dr. Andrew Hendersen**, curator emeritus New York Botanical Garden Institute of Systematic Botany, has been doing field research since the late 1980s. He has described nearly 300 species of palm and written many popular reference guides about palms throughout the Americas and in Vietnam. He has recently been in the Dominican Republic doing research and becoming fascinated by the genus Cocothrinax. He found that understanding the relationships between species in this genus was complicated by its insular distribution pattern, propensity to hybridize, and ability to disperse long distances.


## Arbor Day at the Zoo!

## The Palmengarten: A Botanical Garden in Frankfurt, Germany

My family and I spent the summer in Germany's oldest city Trier (founded in 16 BCE) which sits along the Moselle river, close to France & Luxembourg, and boasts many Roman architectural remains. On the way back to Hawai'i we also got a chance to visit nearby Frankfurt, Germany's financial center. A major highlight for me was a visit to the Palmengarten (Palm Garden), one of Germany's largest botanical gardens.

What a great place to see palms - 220 different species! In total the garden covers 22 hectares (54 acres) with 13,000<sup>1</sup> species and 20 glass houses:

- Palmenhaus (Palm House)
- Tropicarium (14 greenhouses)
- Flower and Butterfly House
- Subantarctic House
- Alpine Houses (2 greenhouses)
- Entrance Display House

The biggest one, the Palmenhaus (palm house) dates from the 19th century and is truly an impressive structure. It even comes with an artificial cave where several small aquariums are located.

In the Palmenhaus, I also discovered a rare palm from the Big Island of Hawai'i: *Pritchardia lanigera*<sup>2</sup>. Assuming I read the label correctly, that palm is almost 30 years old (1993)

At one of the garden houses of the Tropicarium a small tree from the neotropics caught my fascination that is not a palm. Aristolochia arborea<sup>3</sup> (Tree Pipevine) had some cool looking red fruits on the bottom of the trunk. the flowers actually mimic fungi.

You can easily spend a full day at the Palmengarten. We did not even see all greenhouses despite spending the better part of a day there. So if you get a chance, see a great collection of palms in Frankfurt!
